Getting Your Goat Cael dy Gafr

As interest increases in Wrexham's new Royal Welch Fusilier statue of the Goat Major and Regimental Goat, it might be asked how, and from where, did the Royal Welch get their goat?

Goats have long been emblematic of Wales. It is not known when the Royal Welch Fusiliers formally enlisted a goat into its ranks, but its association with the regiment dates back to at least the early eighteenth century – and on special occasions it was suitably decorated. In his Military Collection and Remarks published in 1777 Major Robert Donkin states: "The royal regiment of Welch Fuzileers has a privilegeous honour of passing in review preceded by a Goat with gilded horns, and adorned with ringlets of flowers." and adds, "The corps values itself much on the ancientness of the custom." So this implies a tradition that had existed for many years. But what kind of goat was it?

A colour painting of the 1st Battalion RWF at Manchester in c.1835 shows a brindled goat with no special regalia and it is elsewhere described as a 'venerable Cambrian goat.' So in all probability early goats were taken from the wild herds of Wales whose descendants still roam the more remote areas of Snowdonia. Today the RWF goats are of Kashmir stock – and that's quite a story.

In 1818 two French entrepreneurs, Messrs Ternaux and Jaubert, travelled to the nomadic Kirghiz tribes in search of a species of goat which was almost always of a dazzling whiteness, and which bore every year, in the month of June, a remarkable fleece'. It was the fine fleece that was the attraction. After an arduous and adventurous journey, a herd of Kashmir goats was secured and shipped to Marseilles.

Two years later, in the autumn of 1823, Christopher Thomas Tower (1775-1867), the squire of Weald Hall, near Brentwood, in Essex, was staying in Paris. He bought two bucks and two does from the French herd and settled them in Essex. Eventually, in 1828, a shawl was produced from their wool. It won that

year's Gold Medal of the Society of Arts, and Squire Tower then presented King George IV with a pair of the goats:

that was the beginning of the Royal Windsor herd. But it was not until the generosity of another monarch that they became associated with the RWF. As a member of the regiment the goat accompanied the men on their tours of duty. In 1843 they were posted to the West Indies where over 100 soldiers died from Yellow Fever, and in 1844 the Regimental Goat succumbed to heat stroke. It was in response to this loss that Queen Victoria offered a replacement (and one for the Reserve Battalion of the 23rd) chosen from the royal herd.

A persistent narrative is that these goats were part of a gift to the Queen from the then Shah of Persia, Mohammad Shah Qājār (1808-48), but no evidence has been found to confirm this in the Royal Archives. Any new arrivals would have supplemented the original 1828 herd. By 1848 this had increased to over 200 animals and from time to time new blood stock was introduced. Even so, they suffered from inbreeding, so in 1889 a fresh herd was sent from India.

By 1931 the herd in Windsor Great Park comprised a more manageable 37 goats – 23 billies and 14 nannies. In December 1936 seven goats were sent to London Zoo and the rest (which were to supply the RWF) moved from Windsor to the Paddock at Regent's Park. It seems that some time after the war the herd was moved to Whipsnade Zoo from where a number of RWF goats have been selected over the years.

Another famous source of RWF goats is the herd on the Great Orme, Llandudno. It is believed that two goats from the Windsor herd were introduced to the grounds of Gloddaeth Hall, Llandudno, by Maj-Gen Sir Savage Lloyd-Mostyn DL KCB (1835-1914) and later released onto the Orme. He was Commanding Officer of the 2nd Battalion RWF (1869-80), and of the Regimental Depot at Wrexham (1880-85), and Colonel of the Regiment (1910-1914). He lived at Maes-y-Nant, Marchwiel and is buried in Marchwiel Church. In 1990 a Great Orme goat was posted with the 1st Battalion RWF to Berlin (under Allied Military Government 1945-1994) and is immortalised in bronze in the city.

Today the Regimental Goats (*each a full billy*) are still decorated with gilded horns for special occasions. In 1904 the Mayor and citizens of Lichfield presented the goat of the 1st Battalion with a silver chain and shield which hangs around his neck, and every goat in the Regular and Territorial battalions wears a silver head-plate proclaiming him a gift of the Monarch.

The goat is indeed a very special member of the regiment.

Cutting the Sod Tori y Sod

The 'Cutting the Sod' ceremony took place in January and the task was performed by the Mayor of Wrexham Cllr Ronnie Prince and Colonel Nick Lock of the Royal Welch Fusiliers Regiment.

Also in attendance were several members of the RWF Comrades Association who have been busy fund raising towards the project.

The sculptor Nick Elphick travelled down from Llandudno for the event which was also attended by Offa Community Councillors and school children from Ysgol Bodhyfryd who recited a poem by the Welsh poet Hedd Wynn who famously served in the regiment.

This event starts the beginning of this exciting project to erect a life size sculpture in bronze of a Royal Welch Fusilier and regimental goat in a floodlit landscaped setting in front of the Barracks on Kingsmills Road. The regiment has strong links with the town of Wrexham going back over 300 years and contributions towards the project have come in from individuals, local businesses and community councils.

Since January the bus stop and street light have been relocated away from the site and dropped kerbs installed. In the next few months groundworks for the plinth and footpaths will commence. Preliminary works on the sculpture have taken place and featured on BBC Wales news. It is hoped, all going to plan, for a grand unveiling ceremony on St Davids Day next year which is a big day traditionally in the RWF calendar.



Dog Fouling Problem Problem Baw Ci

In the last 12 months one of the most reported subjects to all Offa Councillors has been the amount of 'dog mess' on the streets, roads, the playing fields and the children's play areas of Offa.

Dog faeces can make children sick, and in some extreme cases, fatally ill. Residents and parents of children walking their loved ones to school have been most vociferous in their reporting of this terrible, anti-social mess. And Head teachers of all Offa Schools have raised this matter at Governors' meetings!

As a Council we have been working tirelessly in trying to encourage Wrexham's County Enforcement Officers and North Wales Police Community Support Officers to challenge offenders and where necessary issue fines and enact enforcement orders to stop those few uncaring and

These are just a few examples of the types of complaints Councillors have been having.

We all know that the majority of dog owners are caring and responsible people who go to great lengths to ensure their dogs' deposits are cleaned up and disposed of correctly. However there seems to be a growing number who are not. They don't care and/or are not aware that their dog has just gone about its normal function in a public area.

Here are some important facts about dog faeces:

- Dog faeces does not act as a fertilizer and does not improve the soil in any way.
- Using dog faeces as garden fertilizer can cause people to become ill
 if they consume the vegetables that have been contaminated with dog faeces.
- Dog faeces is ranked third on the list of factors that contribute to contaminated water.
- Dog faeces pollutes water supplies and kills aquatic life and wildlife.
- Dog faeces can make children sick, and in some extreme cases, fatally ill.

Safe community

We all need to work together to keep our Offa community safe, clean and continue to ensure it is the wonderful place we all know it is.

If you are one of these people who have not been cleaning up your dog mess then start now! You are not only committing an offence but you may also be risking the health of others.



If you see someone out with a dog and their dog make a mess and they have not noticed this or have chosen to ignore it then politely remind them of their duty as a responsible citizen. We know not everyone will be comfortable doing this but unless we all act on this then it will continue.

It will still be one of the most complained about topics and worse still, it will continue to pose a health threat to our children and anyone else who may come into contact with it on their skin.

Little Vawnog Conservation Area Ardal Cadwraeth Fawnog Fach

It has been a year since we first started work at Little Vawnog and, from feedback we have received, we are pleased to have been able to make a positive difference to the woodland.



We have concentrated on improving safety by building hedges from dead branches near the steep drop to the river, which also make a great habitat for wildlife. We have also planted trees in this area of the woodland to create a natural barrier to the river. These were grown and kindly donated by the students at Tri Ffordd for Hft Flintshire.

There will be a small amount of tree works taking place in April to deal with dead trees and reduce the risk of falling branches in the future. We continue to plant to improve the varieties of trees and we have also introduced more bluebells which we hope will provide additional colour in future years.

We have also held some wellbeing and community events. In February and March, we held "relaxation in nature" events with North Wales Wildlife Trust, one of which was for carers in conjunction with North East Wales Carers Information Service (NEWCIS). We hope to secure funding to enable us to hold further community and wellbeing events in the coming months.

We have some events planned in the summer to keep the invasive species Himalayan Balsam under control, the dates and times for these events will be on our social media and website (www.woodsworkcic.co.uk), and we hope to work with schools and other community groups, as such activities have been difficult to arrange so far.

We continue to hold volunteer events where we carry out maintenance in the woodland, on the 2nd and 4th Saturdays of the month between 10am and 12pm. Youth Work Update Diweddariad Gwaith Ieuenctid

After the difficulties of the pandemic, our youth provisions were able to reopen in a somewhat altered manner in October 2021.

We have been able to make use of the firepit on warmer evenings and these sessions see those involved toasting marshmallows and cooking hotdogs over the open flame.

The reopening of clubs was a welcome return and offered a certain sense of normality as we remained under some limited restrictions.

The young people were keen to get back into the clubs and over recent months we have held a range of sessions, in centres covering a range of activities including a session with North Wales Police and the Op Bang team. A Halloween party and more recently a visit from a range of giant creepy crawlies including 8 inch long grasshoppers and large tarantulas.

We now have a PS5 which has gone down extremely well with the young people and there is regular healthy competition amongst those using the centre. We have been able to make use of the firepit on warmer evenings and these sessions see those involved toasting marshmallows and cooking hotdogs over the open flame.

A number of trips have taken place, initially a Christmas bowling trip and more recently, a visit to Chester alongside a group from the Caia Youth Forum.

Our Luke O'Connor Youth Club is set to reopen after Easter, meaning we will have all three Offa clubs open after the final restrictions were removed including the Maesgwyn Community Centre and the Hightown Resource Centre. The groups have already developed programmes for the next 3 months and the whole team are really keen to expand on the good work we have done to re-engage young people to the new normal and we look forward to some exciting times ahead.




